#### **CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

#### 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Being an affiliated constituent college, Curriculum is provided by the department of higher education Govt. of Madhya Pradesh, curriculum for undergraduate classes is designed by Central Board of Studies, Curriculum for P.G.Classes is designed by Board of studies of the university, many teachers are the Chairperson / members of the board of studies of University for different subjects. Institution ensures the effective curriculum delivery through a well-planned and documented procedure. Academic calendar provided by the department of higher education is uploaded on the college website and college strictly adheres to the academic calendar. A detailed timetable is prepared by timetable committee headed by the principal and convened by a senior faculty member. Timetable envelopes efficiently curricular activities like theory classes, practical classes, CCE, tutorials, Chamber consultation hours, ICT, library, value added courses, add-on classes and space is provided for co-curricular activities too. Head of the department takes care of the internal distribution of time table. Syllabus units are distributed to individual teachers depending upon their expertise. Entry behavior of students is judged by individual teachers in the starting classes through quiz and interactions. Teachers prepare the lesson plan and teaching content to deliver to students. Lesson plan is notified to students through notice boards in the departments. The focus has shifted from teacher centric methods of curriculum delivery to Learner centric participative curriculum delivery methodologies. Workshops has been organized on the use of revised Bloom's taxonomy and teachers are inspired to follow this for outcome based delivery of curriculum. Every Faculty member tries to achieve Program Objectives (PO) and Course Objectives (CO) of their branch of study framed in the beginning. College prepares its own Excellence Acquisition Tenure(EAT) module which is a very intricate frame work strewn with academic calendar declared by DHE Bhopal, Value added courses calendar, sports calendar, career guidance calendar, youth festival calendar and Flagship programmes calendar. Different teaching methodologies are adopted by teachers, this includes Lecture method: Lectures are used to convey information, background and theories relating to various scientific laws. Use of ICT: The college is well equipped with state of the art smart class rooms, virtual class rooms, audio-visual and other ICT facilities. Video lectures Simulation Classes Online Groups Field Projects and experiential learning Assignments Workshops & Seminars Value Added courses: Curriculum is enriched and strengthened through 30 hour value added courses, college notifies these value added courses through notice boards and classroom informations. A uniform time table is prepared for Internal Evaluation Exams. Internal exam coordinator ensures smooth conduction of exam and proper valuation of internal books. Examination cell headed by senior faculty keeps track of the syllabus covered, through HOD. The daily diary maintained by teachers keep record of the syllabus covered. Diary is signed by the Individual Teacher and countersigned by HOD and Principal of the college. Of the 13 declared CCE modes, different classes are allotted different CCE modes making the process more analytical and exhaustive, this gives a fair insight into the effective curriculum delivery

TG regularly interacts with the student and help them feel comfortable especially when they are fresh in the first year. The name and contact number of the TG's are communicated to the parents, through students so that they can interact for any assistance and information desired. In addition there is a Counsellor who can assist students if they are facing stress and are getting mentally disturbed. Teacher guardians make a dedicated Register Of Mentee and enters all the mentee related information in that register. Parents are encouraged to write problems faced by their wards in the specified columns. Mentee also make themselves visible through Register of mentee

(ROM). ROM helps in keeping the information intact and easily available as and when required. NLIST ID and password is provided to all teachers .Registers are kept in the manual section as well as in e library to record the footfall of students as well as teachers. All PG departments have their own departmental library ILS (Interlibrary services) are well practiced through central library, this helps research scholars of different departments in their interdisciplinary research, 2. LABORATORY: Laboratories are developed and maintained by the respective departments. Equipments are purchased and maintained as per the need of the particular departments. There is a purchase committee which takes care of the purchase related affairs as per the purchase rules provided by DHE and Gross financial rules published by the govt. from time to time. College has separate UG and PG laboratories to address specific demands of UG and PG students, there is an advanced instrumentation Research Lab in the college with sophisticated advanced equipment like IR (Brooker alpha), UV (LabIndia), Microwave Synthesis, Incubation chambers, HPLC, PCR, GELDOC etc. This laboratory is operated under the guidance of a senior professor, certified Laboratory Technician is appointed in the laboratory to operate and maintain equipments. Laboratory provides opportunity to all the research scholars and faculty of the college to work on the sophisticated equipments. Research scholars from outside the college are also permitted to work on the equipments after taking permissions from the competent authority. A register is prepared where all the usages are recorded. Interdepartmental use of Laboratories and classrooms is always permitted and encouraged. 3. COMPUTERS: College has 2 computer laboratories developed and maintained by department of Computer science and computer application, along with e library and individual computers in the departments. These computer labs are maintained by the self-finance budget of Janabhagidari, and utilized after regular classes for conducting computer based seminars and workshops. These are also used as browsing nodes by non-computer science students also. The computers are periodically checked and updated by the trained specialized computer technician. There are administrative, academic , sports , extension and co-curricular committees headed by coordinators or HODs. These

coordinators and HODs are respectively responsible for calling meetings of their corresponding committees and have full power to take decisions in the presence of principal. Staff Council is responsible to take policy decisions and every staff member has his/her say in the staff council. Important committees like RUSA and Janabhagidari has nodal officer along with other members to take care of related administrative work. Internal Examination cell prepares the calendar for CCE and Practical Exams dates are decided through a well chartered procedure, Departmental meetings are organized by HODs to decide upon the dates , HOD communicates these agreed upon dates in the meeting called by examination Cell In charge and the calendar is prepared and communicated to all departments after signature by the principal. Scholarship Disbursal: Scholarship form forwarding and disbursal is one of the most cumbersome and diligent task, executed by the college administration. 90 of the college students get Scholarships/ awards or benefits under one or the other schemes

which includes Post Matric SC, ST, OBC, Gaon ki Beti, Pratibha Kiran, Awaas Yojna, Awagaman Yojna, Vikramaditya, Central Sector, Aggregated Scheme etc. This Year a nodal officer was appointed amongst the faculty not less than the designation of Associate Professor to take care of these schemes. Different subcommittees are constituted under Nodal officer for different scholarships. There are members from class III section also. Different teams were made for Form forwarding, Form Collection and then finally forms are approved by the principal and sent online to respective scholarship providing organizations for scholarship sanction to students. Form Forwarding officers are faculty which are notified through meetings and formats about the important documents to be submitted with scholarship forms. The participative management applied to scholarship disbursal has reduced the time required in the whole procedure, This made it possible to disburse scholarships on time.

Measurable mechanism is in place to analyse the impact of practice on society as well as on students and on campus too. At College level teachers who are the in charge of NSS, NCC, PDC, Red Cross, Red Ribbon Club and Flagship coordinators plan activities and programmes, communicated to the students through EAT which is an exhaustive and comprehensive module incorporating curricular, co-curricular and sports

activities. EAT is prepared by the IQAC. Registrations are invited from the students for different activities, out of different activities floated in every segment, a student is suggested to opt some activities as per the choice and inclination of student. Students are provided formal and informal training to implement activities as per the need through orientation programmes, a general orientation is organized for all the students during DEEKSHARAMBH in the starting of first year of UG Programme, specific orientation sessions are organized by NSS depending upon the activity. On the first visit to the selected adopted village or the societal residential clusters ,2to 4 responsible society members of the locality are inducted into the teams constituted, these local society members guide the team during complete implementation of the programme. Students keep record of the activities carried out in social laboratory pockets in a diary issued to them, this diary acts as a social ranking card. Here emphasis is not only on studying and practicing science in Laboratories but focus lies on bringing research from labs into the society. An ecosystem has created with conscious efforts with focus on Learner centric experiential learning. Social labs have become an indistinguishable component of teaching, learning and evaluation mechanism. The concerted efforts culminate to the holistic development of students empowered with Intellect, values, concern for the environment and society. Practice is carried out with a well-knit excellence framework strewn around a galaxy of flagship programme through EAT (Excellence Acquisition Tenure). EAT synchronizes various academic and co-curricular activities with in a measurable robust time bound mechanism. There are three axes to the practice concomitant at one point, these are Teachers, students and Society, we call this approach as h^3 approach, where where h stands for head of thinker (Teacher), h for heart of Student, h for heart of society. All students are the genuine beneficiaries of practice, but as per the gap analysis the focus is kept on socioeconomically disadvantaged students, these students have three types of challenges Rural background leading to decreased level of selfperception some time Peer Pressure Language barrier Financial limitations Activities are designed keeping in mind these issues. EXECUTION OF THE PRACTICE DESIGN OF ACTIVITIES (TEACHER): Society Connect Programme is launched by Dean Society Connect Programme. NSS officer, NCC Officer and all Flagship programme coordinators are the members of SCP committee. Activities are designed and communicated to IQAC, IQAC prepares EAT and declares it to all teachers and students. Activities are carried according to EAT. Many activities are launched, students are motivated to join activities as per their interest. In case of society based research projects launched by individual departments, HOD of the concerning department submits the detailed project to R D cell, which is then analyzed and if sanctioned. College provides infrastructural support, ICT Facilities, Remote access to the library and physical library facilities. A Faculty is also appointed to guide these students. Students are encouraged for study tours so that they can not only visit the nearby places of importance but they can mix with the society in general and understand their issues. EXECUTION THROUGH DIFFERENT METHODS (STUDENT): Students are the executors as well as

moderators for the activities. They are provided trainings as and when required to hone their skill sets, necessary information by the teachers and resources required. NSS unit conducts orientation programme for the students in the beginning of every session. NSS and NCC units organize 7 days residential camp in the adopted village/ localities.
